Keywords: 3 - 5 keywords; in alphabet order [Times New Roman 12, italic, justified]

1. Introduction [Times New Roman 12, bold, justified, sentence case]

The introduction should briefly place the study in a broad context and highlight why it is important. It should define the purpose of the work and its significance. The current state of the research field should be carefully reviewed and key publications cited. Please highlight controversial and diverging hypotheses when necessary. Finally, briefly mention the main aim of the work and highlight the principal conclusions. As far as possible, please keep the introduction comprehensible to scientists outside your particular field of research. [Times New Roman 12, justified]

2. Research methodology [Times New Roman 12, bold, justified, sentence case]

This section provides all the methodological details necessary for other scientists to duplicate your work, including: Research design, Instrument, Sampling, Data collection, Data analysis,...

New methods and protocols should be described in detail while well-established methods can be briefly described and appropriately cited. [Times New Roman 12, justified]

3. Research results [Times New Roman 12, bold, justified, sentence case]

This section may be divided by subheadings. It should provide a concise and precise description of the experimental results, their interpretation, as well as the experimental conclusions that can be drawn.

3.1. Subsection 1 [Times New Roman 12, bold, italic, justified, sentence case]

Guidelines for Abbreviations and Acronyms

Define abbreviations and acronyms the first time they are used in the text, even after they have been defined in the abstract. Do not use abbreviations in the title or heads unless they are unavoidable. [Times New Roman 12, justified]

Guidelines for Tables and Figures

Tables and figures should be centred and are numbered independently, in the sequence in which you refer to them in the text. Table captions should appear above tables. Figure captions should be below the figures, and graphics should be accompanied by a legend.

The objective here is to provide an interpretation of your results and support for all of your conclusions, using evidence from your experiment (research) and generally accepted knowledge, if appropriate. Suggest future directions for research, new methods, explanations for deviations from previously published results, etc. [Times New Roman 12, justified]

5. Conclusions [Times New Roman 12, bold, justified, sentence case]

Your conclusion should be the best part of your paper. A conclusion should: (1) stress the importance of the thesis statement, (2) give the paper a sense of completeness, and (3) leave a final impression on the reader.

Implications and/or recommendations can be as a separate section. [Times New Roman 12, justified]

Appendix [Times New Roman 12, bold, justified, sentence case]

The appendix is an optional section that can contain details and data supplemental to the main text

Acknowledgements [Times New Roman 12, bold, justified, sentence case]

Acknowledgements of people, grants, funds, etc should be placed in a separate section not numbered at the very end of the paper. [Times New Roman 12, justified]

References [Times New Roman 12, bold, justified, sentence case]

Do not use Wikipedia for references. Do not use "et. al." Provide issue numbers for papers. Reference section should not be used for commentary and notes.

Referencing needs to be brought in line with the APA (7th. Ed.) system
